

Phone Correspondence regarding Feral Cats at Garner State Park with Park Superintendent Kelby Bridwell.

Conversations with Nancy Johnson (817)-821-3173 about Feral Cats at Garner SP:

- On 11/22/21 Mrs. Johnson contacted me to follow up from my email response (11/18/21) to her website complaint on 11/16/21.
- Mrs. Johnson contact me sometime during early December at my office phone for an update.
- On 12/22/21 (9 min), 12/30/21 (4 min), 1/04/2021 (14 min), 1/13/21 (3 min). Calls were for updates and checking in on what Mrs. Johnson was working on to get volunteers out to park to assist with trapping. Still had not found someone to take cats once trapped. I informed I had reached out to Uvalde Humane Society and they were to discuss with their board if they would allow intake of cats from Garner.

Conversation with Rita Cross (512) 755-1578 (21 min) on 1/17/21:

- Rita states shes with Citizen Advocates for Animals (CAFA) and that she's been in communication with Nancy Johnson to assist with our feral cat issues. We discuss challenges with finding someone to take cats if trapped. She mentions TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) program that she has had success with. I inform her our goal is to get all feral cats removed from park due to conservation purposes and the impacts feral species have on native habitats. So TNR would not work and we must find place that would take them, rehab and then find a home. I inform Cross I will be reaching out to Uvalde Humane Society again to see if their Board of Directors made a decision.

Conversations with Uvalde Humane Society:

- On 12/01/2021, I visit with Ann and am informed that UHS only intakes cats from City of Uvalde Animal Control. I discuss our problem at the park and she states her board of directors are meeting later in the month and she will discuss with board possibilities. She takes my contact info.
- On 12/22/2021, I contact and get a phone recording that they are closed for the holidays.
- On 1/04/2021, I contact UHS, and no one answers. I decide I will go in person when in Uvalde.
